



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

I was not present at the moment, some 2,000 years ago, when the Father turned to the Son and said, "Now is the time of salvation." I cannot imagine the response of the hosts and angels of heaven. Just how much "in the loop" were they when it came to God's plan of redemption? Surely the thought of Jesus coming to earth to live, to love, and to die was outside the boundary of comprehension!

God is full of surprises: just look at creation! Genesis 1 is filled with "Then God said," followed by miraculous results. And in the middle of it all, "God created mankind in His own image, in the image of God He created him; male and female He created them. God blessed them; and God said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth, and subdue it; and rule over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the sky and over every living thing that moves on the earth.' God saw all that He had made, and behold, it was very good." God intended for life to be good, very good.

Christmas is a time which reminds us that the "very good" initiated by God collided with the sin of man. God's ideal yielded to man's insistence to live life his own way. Man's delusion came with a terrible price: separation. Everything "fell apart." Brokenness crushed. Loneliness invaded. Sin corrupted. "The wages of sin is death.

But God committed Himself to the humanity He created and loved. Christmas became a catalyst of grace. God set grace into motion. Isaiah 1:18 states "Come now, and let us reason together, says the Lord. Though your sins are as scarlet, they will be as white as snow; though they are red like crimson, they will be like wool."

Several years ago, a dear friend of mine woke up on Christmas morning to find a six-inch blanket of snow covering the landscape outside his home. This verse (Isaiah 1:18) came to his mind and tears of relief and joy filled his eyes. The year had been "hard." Life had been "tough." Satan had spoken lies to his heart so effectively that at times he actually believed this "father of lies." His spirit was despondent. Joy escaped him. Yet, now, as he looked at the snow, as he looked at his heart, as he looked at Bethlehem, he was gripped by Truth. As Ephesians 2:8-10 says, "For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them."

Jesus came to Bethlehem to go to Jerusalem. He came from the manger to go the cross. "He took our sins and our sorrows and made them his very own." Even today, He invites us to cast all our anxieties upon Him, for He cares for us.

It's true: grace covers. But it also removes. May the sounds of Christmas truly be amazing.

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NOTES FROM STUDENT MINISTRY

During these strange and weird times living in a pandemic, I catch myself feeling like I'm not doing "enough." There are a few reasons for this:

One, it has been modeled for me since childhood. I was raised by a hard-working mother and father. My mother would get up every morning at 5:00 am for as long as I can remember. She would read her Bible, get dressed for the day, wake me and my sister for the school day, see us off to school, then go to work herself. My dad was very similar. He would wake at 6:00 am to read his Bible, get dressed for the day, take us to school (until my sister started driving), and go to his place of employment. They both would work all day and wouldn't get home until 6:00 or 7:00 pm. Yet, we would have time for dinner around the table every single night. They also made time for my sister and I to participate in sports and family church activities. We would never sacrifice church activities because of sports. That was a big no no. They worked hard and showed what they valued most — Christ and their family. When I look at how they raised my sister and I sometimes think to myself, "How on earth did they seem to accomplish so much and yet have equal time for Christ and their kids?" Therefore, I look at what's been modeled for me and wonder, "Am I doing enough? My parents 'seemed' to accomplish so much more."

Two, it's my personality. I always work with the sense that someone is looking over my shoulder, and if I don't do enough or do it the right way then they are out to get me! Now, that's not always a bad thing. There are some good reasons to have this quality. I usually can be trusted to get things turned in on time. I can pretty much get things done the right way if given clear instructions. I like to do things with integrity, honesty, and sincere love for others in mind. Call it pride, but I don't want anyone thinking that I have done a 50% job on what should have been 120% (as my high school football coach said).

Three, I feel like my job never stops. This isn't a complaint; I am called to the ministry. I get to work for the Lord and I love it! However, all ministers of the gospel feel the same weight and pressure. We want to be available and ready to serve the body of Christ no matter what time of day or night and no matter the day of the week. We love people. We are ready to counsel, pray, and encourage when others need us. This is not a burden. However, we can feel on edge at times. We don't know when we will get the next phone call, text, or email. This makes the minister of the gospel work even "harder" at doing things the "right way" so others will not be discouraged. Not a bad thing at all – just an honest comment about the day in the life of a minister.

Nonetheless, I come back to the original statement: "During these strange and weird times living in a pandemic, I catch myself feeling like I'm not doing 'enough.' Is this ok?" It's not necessarily healthy, here's why:

One, my parents are also sinners saved by God's grace. They aren't perfect. They weren't perfect parents. I know this now more than ever since I am also a parent. I realize they made mistakes as all people do. Also, from their perspective, they probably at times felt the same as I do now. At the end of the day, my parents will disappoint.

Two, my personality is made up of all sorts of emotions. My emotions can change like the morning news. Much of what makes up a personality has to do with emotions. I'm not making scientific claims, I'm just stating the obvious. If we rely solely on personality traits (which God gave us) and the shallowness of emotions and fears, then we will never feel like we have done "enough." At the end of the day, my personality will disappoint.

Three, the ministry isn't going anywhere. People will always be around. People should be the minister's heart. I love people! I want everyone to receive Christ and to fully live for His glory alone. However, at the end of the day...people are people. That isn't cold, but there has to be something more we

are living for in our occupation and vocation than just for the encouragement of someone else's needs. I've been told this is the main reason most missionaries leave the mission field to come back home: because they haven't seen the 'fruit' of ministry like they thought they would see (namely, people coming to Christ and growing in Him). If ministry becomes primarily about people, ministers will also quickly burn out. At the end of the day, ministry will disappoint.

What then is the solution? Rest in Christ, and in Christ alone. That's it. I don't have to walk around thinking, "Am I doing enough?" Why? Because the Lord of Glory and suffering servant worked on my behalf, I have everything I need in Christ, the better and 2nd Adam. God told Adam to work and tend the garden. He told him to name the animals and, with Eve, to multiply and fill the earth. The goal was to subdue the earth and make "heaven on earth." That didn't happen. Adam failed. Adam sinned. Now, the entire human race is plunged into the work "by the sweat of our brow."

Insert Jesus Christ. He came to earth as our covenantal head, representative, and 2nd Adam. He fulfilled all of the Law's demands. He represented the human race perfectly and accordingly to God's original standard. No one else could do this. No one else could measure up. Everything else and everyone else will disappoint.

Knowing this, why am I always trying to earn His approval? Why am I always left with the nagging feeling that what I'm doing and what I'm not doing isn't enough for Christ and His Church? Has the ministry become my Lord? Maybe the pandemic has exposed some flaws in how I minister to the Lord's Church and my own family? Maybe some of the work I was doing, pre-pandemic, was work for the wrong reasons? Have I forgotten about the Lord in the process? Has my doing and working replaced the One to whom we are to minister? Yes. I have put my faith more in things that will disappoint.

Anytime we have "what we're doing/what we're not doing" as the primary reason and motivator in life – we have lost our focus. However, the focus is Christ. The ministry is Christ. We live for Christ. I teach and preach for Christ. I lead worship for Christ. I do Zoom meetings for Christ. I send out Remind text messages for Christ. Everything I do, including my living, breathing, and being – is all found in Christ! (Acts 17,1 Cor. 10:31, Gal. 2:20). Now, with that attitude, it makes me want to work harder. Not for worldly results or to satisfy the Lord – but because the Lord first loved me! If I won't be happy until I get pre-pandemic youth attendance numbers, then I will never be happy again. That's not my objective. That's not my goal and purpose in life. Numbers will disappoint. Ministry will sometimes get stale. The Church won't always be booming and the offering won't always meet the projected budget. Disappointment is a fact of life. Christ, however, is the never-shifting, never-changing, omniscient, omnipotent, sovereign Lord that deserves our praise and worship – no matter the circumstance! He never disappoints!

Let's rest in Christ this holiday season. He paid it all, all to Him I owe; sin left a crimson stain – Jesus washed it white as snow. That is enough!




Congratulations to Megan Downey who was the winner of the *Holy Land Illustrated Bible*. We have two copies of this new Bible available for checkout in the library.

It is a great time to learn to use the online e-book system, as many are trying to stay home and stay safe. To set up an account, go to the church website, scroll over "Ministries" and click on the library tab. You will log in with your library card ID number. Put fbc in front of the number and add enough zeroes to make it eight digits. For example: If your number is 534, your login would be fbc00000534. You will then add your name and e-mail address. Then, click register.

After your account is set up, you will be able to enjoy our e-books and audio books. The system allows check out for two weeks and then automatically checks the book back in. If you are not finished, feel free to check out the book for an additional two weeks. If you don't know your library card number or don't have a library card, call the library and we will help you get started. The app for the online system, Axis 360, is available on Apple and Android.
