NOTES FROM THE PASTOR

"My friend," John Adams wrote to Thomas Jefferson toward the end of both of their lives, "you and I lived in serious times." (The Adams-Jefferson Letters)

There have been many "serious times" throughout history which challenged Christians to rise up and face forces that are destructive and demeaning to mankind. As James Emery White reflected upon the days of Adams and Jefferson, he wrote, "Serious times met with serious lives." Thomas Paine wrote, "These are times that try men's souls." Paine's opening sentence in "The Crisis" papers stated: "The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of his country." It was these words that inspired the soldiers of Washington to not give up, which led to a victorious shift that led to the birth of a nation.

Another revolution took place some 2,000 years ago. First Century Christians gave birth to a unique expression of the presence of God in the heart of the Roman Empire. It cost them their lives; but it was in the losing of their lives that they found Life. They went to their grave knowing their life mattered. It counted for something. It made a difference. Someone benefitted from a faith that refused to be compromised.

Jesus said, "You are the light of the world. A city on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine." Matthew 5:14-16. His followers did just that; and made history.

James Emery White went on to say that, "For Jesus, seizing the day meant responding to the challenge of the moment." 1 Chronicles 12:23 says, "These are the men who understood the times and knew what Israel should do."

Our country, our community, and our families are in a unique time for those of us who proclaim Christ, who identify as "Christian," who say we are followers of Christ. It is a serious task to represent Christ to a lost world. The commandments of Christ to love the Lord and our neighbor are repeated throughout Scripture. # NOTES FROM STUDENT MINISTRY

What have we learned so far from COVID-19? Surely we haven't gone through the intricate web of uncertainty and the abrupt interference of our busy American routines to plunge head-first into isolation and quarantine and haven't learned anything. I have learned many things. However, one inconvenient lesson I've learned has recently surfaced like the monster that hides under the bed, ready to snatch at your legs as you lie down to sleep! It's inconspicuous, not easily noticed, more enticing at night (when tired and not willing to engage with a good book or human conversation) and often grabbing my attention in the most vulnerable moments. I'm talking about my cell-phone addiction.

I have an inkling that you just resonated with my addiction. Why? As Tony Reinke points out in his book 12 Ways Your Phone Is Changing You, "Within a few years of its unveiling, the smartphone had become part of us, fully integrated into the daily patterns of our lives. Never offline, always within reach, we now wield in our hands a magic wand of technological power we have only begun to grasp. But it raises new enigmas, too. Never more connected, we seem to be growing more distant. Never more efficient, we have never been more distracted."



He's right. This has been a problem for me. Reinke reminds us, "Tech wiz Steve Jobs introduced the iPhone at Macworld Expo on January 9, 2007, as a 'giant' 3.5-inch high-res screen requiring no physical keyboard or stylus. Unlike the clunky smartphones to date, he announced: 'We're going to use the best pointing device in the world. We're going to use a pointing device that we're all born with – born with ten of them. We're going to use our fingers.' From

that moment, the magic of multitouch technology would introduce highly accurate fingertip gestures to a pocket device, bringing humans into more intimate proximity to their computing technology than ever before. When Jobs later announced, as an aside, 'You can now touch your music,' the magnitude of the statement was too mystical to grasp in the moment." Well, it's not too mystical to imagine anymore. It's reality. There's something euphoric about swiping your finger in the typical vertical or horizontal motion that gives us comfort. We get a thrill by checking our social media feeds. We can't seem to do anything in the mornings without first checking that little electronic gremlin. It sucks us in, doesn't it? It's like we feel as though we can't live without it. What if I miss an email? What if by delaying my response to an email – the sender gets offended or worse - they feel like I don't care? What if I don't immediately text them back? What if I miss live and breaking news? What if I don't get to see what my grandmother's cousin's friend had for dinner last night?



These are anxieties that we live with. Why? We are simply addicted to our devices. We run our lives by our devices. In fact, we tend to conversate with our devices and spend more time with them than we do actual people. Let alone, God. An older statistic from 2015 (much higher now in 2020) tells us, "...among American adults eighteen to twenty-nine years old, 86 percent own a smartphone, up from 52 percent four years earlier. In the same demographic, 50 percent own a tablet, up from just 13 percent four years earlier." (Reinke, pg. 38). Jacques Ellul suggest-ed, "our technology exerts a sort of terrorism over us. We live under the threat that if we fail to embrace new technologies, we will be pushed aside into cultural obsolescence, left without key skills we need to get a job, disconnected from cultural conversations, and separated from our friends." (Reinke, pg. 38).

Why am I admitting to you this addiction? Why am I saying this? Also in Reinke's book, Tony says, "We check our smartphones about 81,500 times each year, or once every 4.3 minutes of our waking lives..." (Reinke, pg. 41). Which that means that you will be tempted to check your phone three times before you finish this October edition of the Manna! This is serious. What's the solution? I know prayer and the Word of God is key. I know repenting of my sin is necessary. I know asking the Lord to help me curb technology appetites and the overindulgence of 'zoning out' with that little device will be a good first step. I also know that reaching out to solid, Christian-based, gospel-driven books will be super helpful. I'm on this journey, and I would like for you to go with me!

Let's read two books on the subject. First, Tony Reinke's book (which is mentioned several times in this article) will be a good place to start. Again, it's called *12 Ways Your Phone Is Changing You.* Read it. Devour it. Take notes. Pray and seek God's face with this resource. Another good book would be to read Andy Crouch's book entitled *The Tech-Wise Family*. This is a great book that gives us the resources to not only be able to curb those technological addictions – but to see that your life is also about 'building character, wisdom, and courage rather than accepting technology's promises of ease and instant gratification."

Dear Lord Jesus, I repent. I have put my cellphone and other electronic devices in a position that stirs my affections and captures my attention more than is needed (and frankly wanted). Please help me. I repent. I thank you for your glorious gospel. I thank you for the forgiveness already won in Christ! May I return to a less-distracted version of the person you have created me to be! To God be the glory! Amen!"

#### **Reopening Kids1st Worship and MidWeek**

We are preparing to welcome our kids back this month! Our goal is to have Kids1st worship and our preschool area open at 11 am begining Sunday, October 11 and to relaunch Midweek on Wednesday, October 14. To do this, we need you! Sign up to serve at fbcmurray.org/serve.

- You must RSVP and pre-register your children each week for Kids1st Worship and MidWeek so we can make sure our class sizes are safe. You can do this at fbcmurray.org/ rsvp. This also gives us the opportunity to streamline check in so that we don't group up and create an unsafe environment as we enter the preschool or elementary areas.
- Children who are in our 4 and 5 year old classrooms and up will be asked to wear masks, as will our volunteers. We will be taking temperatures at the door.
- Please don't send anything from home with your child. Small children may have diapers, wipes, and bottles, but please don't send toys, bags, or other items with your older children.
- When you enter the welcome area of either floor you will be greeted by someone from our children's team who will check your child in and walk them to their class. Parents, we ask if you are not volunteering that week to please not enter the classroom areas.
- Please pick your children up immediately after your service or Bible study ends. Please do not linger in the welcome area of either floor.

#### Kids1st Bible Study Content

This month in Kids1st Worship our unit is called "To the Cross." As people began to turn against Jesus, He journeyed toward Jerusalem where He knew He would be arrested and crucified. Jesus continued to tell people that they needed to repent, and He prepared His true followers for His death. Soon after Jesus arrived in Jerusalem, He was betrayed, arrested, tried, and crucified. Our Big Picture Question this month is: "What did Jesus do to save us? Jesus lived a sinless life, died on the cross, and rose from the dead."

#### MidWeek Bible Study Content

Our preschoolers and children at Mother's Day Out will be learning that God is with you wherever you go through their theme "Singing in the Rain." We will be learning how God saved Shadarach, Meshach, and Abednego from the fire, how God saved Moses in the basket, how God heard Hagar's son crying in the desert and gave them water they needed, and how God told Noah to build an ark and saved him and his family from the flood. We will be memorizing "God is with you wherever you go," from Joshua 1:9.

Our elementary-aged children will be learning about integrity, or "choosing to be truthful in whatever you say and do." They will be learning about Daniel's integrity in Daniel 1, how there are no secrets from God in 1 John 1:9, and about Naaman and Elisha's servant from 2 Kings 5 and how we should focus on what is true from Philippians 4:8. We are memorizing Proverbs 10:9, which says "Anyone who lives without blame walks safely. But anyone who takes a crooked path will get caught."
